We elected officers to the state board and delegates to the National Convention. We sent 14 delegates and one alternate to Grapevine, Texas, mind you I never saw any of those grapevines they are so proud of.

As a delegation we carried out our duties to the best of our abilities, with Art Courcy serving on the constitution committee and myself being a chairman of one of the teller's committees. I give credit to National Officer Clifford Dailing for making the counting of ballots much easier this year. Those counting machines simplified life.

As your State President I was again involved in the Parade of States opening ceremony, and I was also honored to carry the flag of the United States Coast Guard during the military honors.

I guess the most significant event to happen at this year's convention was the signing of your new contract. Postmaster Brennan and National President Ronnie Stutts signed the contract before the National Delegate body, this was a first.

This is my view of things about that, less than 20,000 ballots were cast out of almost 98,000. There were 2,600 cast in the negative and so of those in the affirmative there was 86% of the vote. Those who abstained from voting must have thought the contract was good enough or more would have raised their voices in the negative. It now is what it is no matter how you feel.

A short word on safety is in order. It always seems we need to be reminded no matter how many times safety talks are presented. The only truth is that if you aren't being careful once you drive out of the office lot, then you are at risk. Out on the streets you are your own safety officer, and even when we are as careful as can be, we can never account for the other driver behind the wheel. 

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Binding Resolutions and Delegate Voting Record 115th National Convention 2019



- 1) **(Finance) (PASSED) BE IT RESOLVED:** That National Office explores the options of using modern technology to interact w/membership. Examples: Live video ratification meetings, trainings, booster meetings, etc.
- (CT) (FAILED) BE IT RESOLVED: That the NRLCA returns the selection of Academy Trainers to the State Board as representatives of the NRLCA.
- 3) (CT) (FAILED) BE IT RESOLVED: That the NRLCA returns oversight of the Rural Carrier Academy to the State Board.
- 4) **(CT) (FAILED) BE IT RESOLVED**: That the NRLCA allow and encourage meetings between State Presidents and District Management.
- 5) (CT) (FAILED) BE IT RESOLVED: That the NRLCA President set up a meeting at each Area Conference with all attending State Presidents to discuss issues facing the craft in their respective states.
- 6) (GA) (PASSED without objection) BE IT RESOLVED: That non-delegate members in good standing shall be provided all forms of information afforded to elected delegates necessary to perform the duties of elected delegates (i.e. Officer Reports, Committee Reports, times and places of meetings, etc)

Rural Route Digitization Program

What is Rural Route Digitization?

Beginning on March 28, 2019, the USPS began utilizing the GPS "breadcrumb" information collected by the MDD (Scanner) to plot the line of travel for each rural route. The route mileage obtained from this information is then to be compared to the paid mileage for the route and the official line of travel on PS Form 4003 (Official Rural Route Description).

If used properly, the digitization program is a tool that management can use to identify mileage discrepancies in route data. Your MDD device with GPS technology collects breadcrumbs as you drive through your daily line of travel while delivering your route. No mileage changes should be made without the current remeasurement process being utilized. That being said, in order for your mileage to officially be changed, a manager should physically drive through the route following the official line of travel. The carrier has the right to accompany management in a non-duty status during the re-measurement.

Rural Carrier work methods should **NOT** be altered in any way by this data collection.

Beginning on March 28, 2019, the USPS began utilizing the GPS "breadcrumb" information collected by the MDD (Scanner) to plot the line of travel for each rural route.

In expecting many questions regarding the digitization program from carriers, our national office has prepared the following questions and answers regarding the subject:

Q. Will my line of travel be changed due to this breadcrumb data collection?

A. Possibly. If the data collection shows that there is a more efficient way to travel your route and make all assigned deliveries, management has always had the right to make changes to your line of travel. Of course, safety concerns such as avoiding left turns, U-turns etc. would have to considered.

O. Will management change the PS Form 4003 or my paid mileage using data collected from the breadcrumbs?

A. The MDD GPS data should not be used to change mileage. An official route remeasurement is the only contractual method of changing the 4003 or the paid mileage on a route.

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Q. Can management remeasure my route based on information collected by the MDD?

A. Yes. Article 30.1.E governs Route Remeasurement.

"Rural Routes shall be remeasured upon request of the rural carrier or when the Employer determines it is necessary. The rural carrier assigned to the route has the right to be present in a non-duty status at the remeasurement."

Q. How will a remeasurement be done?

A. The remeasurement can be done using a vehicle equipped with a calibrated odometer. The parties are still in discussion over possible GPS devices we might agree to use for route remeasurement. Due to many discrepancies between the digitized miles and the official route miles being paid for on the route, we have been receiving numerous calls from carriers regarding this program. Regardless of the reason that the mileage does not match, the most important thing to remember is that there have been no changes made or any changes agreed upon by the parties that would allow a route's official mileage to change without physically driving to remeasure the route. Yes, your mileage could be changed after the physical re-measurement, but it cannot be changed solely because the digitization shows a discrepancy. If this occurs, please contact your assigned steward and we will address it with the district immediately.

Safety

If you have not already experienced it, you most likely will soon. Currently, there is a much larger focus on safety throughout the entire Northeast Area. Specifically, in the Greater Boston and CT Valley District, there are more driver observations being conducted by management than we've seen in the recent past. This really should be nothing to worry about if we are all following the proper rules of driving and delivering the mail safely. Most importantly (and we have all heard this many, many times throughout our careers) when you dismount the vehicle, set the hand brake, place the gear selector in park, curb the wheels, turn off the engine and remove the keys. Also, be sure that your wheels are curbed in the proper direction. When parking your vehicle on a downhill slope with a curb, turn your wheels "into" the curb. When parking uphill with a curb, turn your wheel "out" from the curb. If there is no curb, turn your wheels to the side of the road you are parking on. If you will be out of sight of the vehicle, be sure to secure the vehicle and its contents. There are still too many rollaway/ runaway instances happening out there. Following these steps will prevent a vehicle from moving while unattended. Please take the time to work safely. If you are being pressured into hurrying and rushing by local management, contact your steward and we can address it with higher level management. No one should be put into a position by someone else to work unsafe. Likewise, don't put yourself in an unsafe position by not following proper dismount procedures.

The convention started off with talk of the contract being ratified by 86% of the members returned ballots. So let's stop here & discuss this.
